What do young adults (18-30 years old) think about the role of English and Spanish in the United States?



CONCLUSION

Almost all participants indicated respect for both English and Spanish speakers and a role for both languages in society. Some reported frustration over language barriers, but also communicated awareness of how difficult it is to learn a second language. The majority recognized that there is not an official language and do not support creating one due to a possible increase in language-based discrimination. At the same time, many participants affirmed the importance of learning English and recognized the benefits and opportunities that come with being bilingual.
